

- 1. War March of the Priests Mendelssohn
 A stirring, warlike march, displaying the full power of the organ.
- A southing, warring match, displaying the full power of the organ.
- 2. Evening Song Bairstow
 A quiet, restful composition by an eminent English organist.
- 3. Romance Sans Paroles Bonnet

 Joseph Bonnett is an organist well-known in this country. His
- organ compositions are typical of the modern French school.

 4. March Funebre et Chant Seraphique Guilmant

This great composition was dedicated by the composer to the memory of his mother, and was first played at the opening of the great organ in the Cathedral of Notre Dame, Paris, in 1870.

The March Funebre opens with the theme announced in the pedals, gradually building up to a great climax in which the Trumpets are heard sounding the Resurrection. The beautiful Chant Seraphique (Song of the Angels) follows—the melody being played in the Pedals with harp-like accompaniment on the manuals. This is one of Guilmant's greatest compositions.

6. Londonderry Air Arr. by Coleman

A transcription of an old Irish Folk-Song.

7. Allegretto in E flat Wostenholme

William Wostenholme, a celebrated English organist, has contributed many works of value to modern music. The Allegretto is a transcription, the work having originally been written for Viola and Piano.

8. Rhapsody on Catalonian Folk Songs Gigout

A brilliant rhapsody on themes of the folk songs of Catalonia, written by a modern French organist, only recently deceased.

9. Vocal Selections Mrs. Jameson

Pietro A. Yon, Italian by birth, American by adoption, brilliant as an organist and composer, is the only organist ever to have received an appointment as Honorary Organist to the Vatican. Mr. Yon clearly demonstrates that there can be humor in music and that the organ can display humor as well.

11. Minuet in A Boccherini

A dainty minuet, written over 100 years ago, and practically the only work of this composer to survive this period.

12. Concert Variations Bonnett

Following a florid introduction on the full organ, the theme is announced, and carried through a number of variations. A pedal cadenza of some length introduces the Finale. This composition displays the full powers and tonal variety of the organ.

Description of the Organ

The organ was built by the Estey Organ Company of Brattleboro, Vt., who built the organ which served for so many years in the old church. The pipes from the old organ are incorporated in the new instrument. There are altogether seventeen speaking stops and 902 speaking pipes. Among the new features incorporated in the organ is the Estey Luminous Stop Console. This is the only console of this type in Western Pennsylvania. The Tilting Tablets, draw stops and key stops commonly found in other instruments have been entirely eliminated, the stops and couplers being controlled by illuminated pistons placed over the Swell Manual. The pressing of the piston brings the stop on and lights a light underneath the head of the piston. Pressing the piston again throws the stop off, darkening the light.

The console is an ingenious piece of mechanism, containing thousands of electric contacts for the keys, stops, pedals and various couplers. It is provided with a large number of adjustable combination pistons which instantly give any desired change in the number of stops which the organist wishes to use. Any combination desired by the organist can be set on these pistons so that one touch on the piston will throw on or off any desired tonal combination.

The action throughout is the most approved type of electro-pneumatic, that is, the connection between the console and the organ consists of a cable containing thousands of insulated wires.

The Estey Reedless Oboe is a feature.

Patented Acoustic Bass Pipes are used to eliminate the necessity of mitreing or bending over the pipes in the organ chamber.

Altogether, the instrument is one of the finest in Warren or vicinity. The voicing of each individual stop not only being of the highest type but the ensemble tone being rich and full without harshness and giving a most satisfactory blending and balance.

Gur Church Building

In selecting the style of architecture for our new church we have departed somewhat from the usual design of churches as we have known them in the past.

Almost the universal practice of the north has been to use the Gothic type of architecture. It seemed wise to us to depart from this practice.

The classic style which we have used lends itself admirably to our needs. It blends in with the surroundings, is distinctive and suits our needs from a practical standpoint most admirably.

The classic designs as we know them were at the height of their development during the period from 460 to 430 B. C. They were developed by the Greeks and Romans, the Greeks having three styles, the Doric, Ionic and Corinthian while the Romans afterward added the Tuscan and Composit. They are characterized by the lowness of roof; absence of arches; horizontility of line; beams, columns and their super-imposed entablature. This was the first style of architecture developed in Europe and was borrowed partly from the Egyptians. The classic design is noted for its simplicity and dignity.

The Gothic style was developed about the middle of the 13th Century and flourished in France, England and Germany. Its chief characteristics are its pointed arches, pinnacles, spires, buttresses, clustered pillars, vaulted roofs and profusion of ornament.

The Classic design as we have used it is largely used in the Southern States and is gradually being adopted in the North because of its economical construction and upkeep. This style lends itself beautifully to our locality and surroundings. With Gothic churches of two distinctly different periods in the same block an entirely different design for our building adds to the beauty of this civic center of Warren. This design is also in harmony with the Library and the Conewango Club building which is Colonial.

Our building is designed for a maximum of utility in keeping with the most advanced ideas of Community service and the needs of a modern church school. The auditorium, while bright and cheerful is eminently dignified and beautiful, thus instilling in the hearts of those who gather there a true sense of reverence and worship.

The Sunday School unit is large, and designed to fulfill the utmost need in our religious educational program. Planned for a completely graded school we have provided every known convenience for a genuine educational program. There are separate class rooms, cloak rooms, drinking fountains, blackboards, bulletin boards, kitchenette, baskets for papers and envelopes without disturbance to the classes, Boys' Club room, ladies parlor, rest room, pastor's study and board room with fireplaces, bookcases, closets and all conveniences for service and worship.

In the recreational unit in the basement are found a large basketball court with fifteen foot ceiling, a built in stage with footlights and flood lights, built in, fire proof motion picture booth and a large and fully equipped kitchen.
